Dear Senator Stewart-Cousins:

I am writing on behalf of the Council for Responsible Nutrition (CRN), the leading trade association representing the dietary supplement and functional food industry,¹ to convey our opposition to Senate Bill S1239 as written. While CRN understands the underlying intent of this legislation, we are troubled by the provision related to products that are “Generally Recognized As Safe” (GRAS). Specifically, the legislation would establish mandatory reporting requirements for companies that use GRAS substances in their products. CRN believes that efforts should be made to strengthen enforcement mechanisms that ensure the GRAS process is used responsibly but does not support additional requirements or changes to the current system.

The mandatory reporting requirements include the submission of detailed information on GRAS substances that would be entered into a searchable public database. The resources required for New York state regulators to process and review submissions, as well as to develop and implement the database, are expected to be substantial.

To recover the costs associated with the proposed reporting requirements, manufacturers of GRAS substances, which include dietary ingredients used in dietary supplements, may be subject to unspecified fees. These fees incurred by manufacturers, along with the burden of the new reporting requirements, may result in increased costs of dietary supplement products, which are used by millions of Americans to help maintain a healthy lifestyle. The dietary supplement industry is also critical to New York’s economy, accounting for over \$12.5 billion in

total economic impact, over 18,000 direct jobs, and \$1.5 billion in tax revenue.² For the reasons outlined above, we cannot support S1239. The health and well-being of all Americans is CRN's highest priority, and thus we are grateful for the New York State Legislature's commitment to its constituents' health.
